US NMCB SIXTY-TWO HISTORY

U.S. Naval Mobile Construction Battalion Sixty-Two was originally established at Davisville, Rhode Island on December 20, 1942. Their first job was at Pearl Harbor where they were the first military construction unit to take over from civilian builders. There they built repair and service facilities until September of 1944 at which time they began three months of military training to ready them for the big job ahead — Iwo Jima. The Battalion landed on Iwo Jima on D-Day plus seven and started continuous work despite mortar attacks and sniper fire. The SEABEES moved inland with other American forces and began to repair captured enemy airstrips as soon as they were taken. The Batta ion went to Japan soon after V-J Day and was disestablished there leaving behind them a reputation for achievement.

Twenty-one years later, on July 2, 1966, NMCB Sixty-Two was re-established in Gulfport, Mississippi under the command of Commander William J. Richeson. After military and technical training in Gulfport and four weeks of combat instruction at Camp Lejeune, North Carolina, the Battalion deployed to Phu Bai in the northern I Corps of South Vietnam. This deployment saw the completion of numerous important combat related projects. A second deployment began in January of 1968 at Danang, South Vietnam. Ammunition dumps, living huts, mess halls, towers, tanks, roads and bridges were some of the projects carried on during this deployment. Dong Ha was the site of Sixty-Two's third deployment which began in the spring of 1969. Jobs accomplished by Sixty-Two during this deplayment included an electrical distribution system, hospitals, wells, loading ramps, bunkers, gunpads, observation towers, a fuel station, water distribution systems and living and working quarters for combat forces in northern I Corps camps. It was announced in August that Sixty-Two had won the Best of Type "E" for Atlantic Fleet SEABEE Battalions for fiscal year 1969. After another round of homeport military and technical training Sixty-Two started its fourth Vietnam deployment at Danang in April of 1970. Battalion assignments for this deployment included highway improvements, barracks, aircraft revetments, the Ban Nit cofferdam, reconstruction of a bridge on National Route QL1, two river patrol boat bases, facilities for the Marines' 1st Medical Battalion and the repair of Cao Do Bridge. During the deployment the battalion was presented the Peltier Award for fiscal year 1969 and the Best of Type "E" for fiscal year 1970. The Battalion also received the Army Meritozious Unit Commendation for their work during the previous deployment at Dong Ha.

The next deployment was a change of pace for Sixty-Two. Roosevelt Roads Naval Station, Puerto Rico was the deployment site and the primary mission was to be the Atlantic Fleet Alert Battalion. The main body also carried on construction projects at Roosevelt Roads in support of the Atlantic Fleet Weapons Range and other commands. Details were maintained at Guantanamo Bay, Cuba and Thurmont and Solomons, Maryland throughout the deployment. Details were also sent to Culebra and Vieques off the coast of Puerto Rico, Fort Allen Naval Communications Station in Puerto Rico, Andros Island, New London, Connecticut and Camp Lejeune, North Carolina. One of the high points of the deployment was the presentation to the Battalion of the Peltier Award for fiscal year 1970 signifying once again that Sixty-Two had surpassed her sister battalions in achievements.

In July of 1972 Sixty-Two deployed to the British owned island of Diego Garcia in the Indian Ocean tasked with the building of a Naval Communications Station. The Battalion joined forces with a detail from NMCB Ten which was later relieved by a detail from NMCB One Thirty-Three. The deployment to Diego Garcia was a unique one in that Sixty-Two was assigned to work on the construction of an entire permanent facility rather than advanced base

components or isolated permanent structures as was the case in the past deployments to Vietnam and Puerto Rico. The projects included an 8,000 foot runway, transmitter and receiver buildings, and other buildings necessary to carry on the functions of a communications station. In addition to the permanent projects SIXTY-TWO carried out a coral reef blasting and quarrying operation and operated four rock crushers, an aggregate dryer, two concrete batch plants, a precasting yard, and a concrete block plant. A new method of project and personnel management based on creation of specialized crews and sequencing the crews from job to job as needed also made the deployment unique. Two projects on which SIXTY-TWO expended the most labor were the runway and Bachelor Enlisted Quarters # 1. The runway was approved for regular Military Airlift Command flights during the deployment. All the structural and a large part of the interior work was completed on BEQ # 1. The achievements of the Battalion on Diego Garcia allowed the Naval Communications Station to begin operations on schedule and made another proud chapter in the history of NMCB SIXTY-TWO.

NMCB SIXTY-TWO's most recent deployment was on September 19th 1973 to Guam, Marianas Islands, with details initially located at Adak, Alaska and Midway Island. On Guam SIXTY-TWO accumulated a long list of fill-in jobs for numerous Commands in addition to major tasked jobs. For the Main Body these included interior rehab of COMCOSRON III, Headquarters Building, construction of the Naval Communications Station CPO Club, paving repairs to Naval Magazine Roads, construction of the 30th Naval Construction Regiment Headquarters Building and Construction of the Navy Regional Medical Center Swimming Pool. Later in the deployment two more details were established at San Miguel, Philippines in January 1974 and Atsugi, Japan in February 1974. Highlights of the deployment included an Air Det exercise which received a grade of outstanding from the 30th Naval Construction Regiment and an embarkation to Rota Island, north of Guam, where approximately 12 men graded and compacted a coral base runway.

NMCB 62 IN THE PACIFIC

As NMCB 62 departed Gulfport at the end of September, it was well known that the Battalion's home for the next eight months would be the island of Guam. What was not well known was that nearly two hundred men from the Battalion would be spread throughout the Pacific Ocean on various details making the Minuteman Battalion a familiar organization in many areas.

Two details and a Seabee team were on their way to widely separated deployment sites in the Pacific at the same time the main body of the Battalion departed for Guam. On the island of Midway, some 1300 miles west of Hawaii, 39 men of Sixty-Two were quickly at work installing a water well system, repairing a runway, and repairing all the island's roads. This detachment completed its work and returned to the main body site on Guam at the end of March.

Straight north of Midway about 1700 miles is the cold, windy base at Adak, Alaska, where a detachment of 40 men continued the conversion of a hangar into an elaborate hobby shop. When completed, the structure will contain shops to provide the residents of this isolated base many pleasurable hours.

Seabee Team 6209, comprised of 13 men, was involved in Civic Action work on Truk Island located 600 miles southeast of Guam in the Trust Territory of the Pacific. Their mission was twofold in that they were involved in many different construction projects plus training a number of the local populace to become proficient in construction skills.


Shortly after arriving on Guam, Sixty-Two sent an augment of 14 men to the island of Yap to assist a Seabee Team of NMCB 74 in completing a 4800 foot soil cement runway. The project on this island 450 miles southwest of Guam was completed and a ribbon cutting ceremony held on December 3, 1973.

In December, 12 men with their required equipment boarded a landing craft and headed for the island of Rota some 25 miles north of Guam. Their project was to level and extend the existing runway on the island; a job which took about four months to complete.

Fifteen hundred miles west of Guam at San Miguel in the Philippine Islands, a 32 man detail took over the construction of an arts and crafts hobby shop during the middle of January. Sixty-Two completed the project in May.

In February a detail departed for Atsugi, Japan. These 26 men devoted the remainder of the deployment rehabilitating a barracks. When completed the barracks will provide 15 modern, private rooms for men working at this Naval Air Facility.

NMCB Sixty-Two was not on a deployment to Guam; it was on a deployment to the Pacific Ocean. The variety of jobs and the variety of locations provided 62's men with numerous interesting and unique experiences. They all left behind many satisfied customers who will long enjoy the quality work done by the men of NMCB Sixty-Two.

Perhaps.



CHARLIE COMPANY


The Guam deployment was an eventful one for Charlie Company. Most of the construction jobs undertaken by the company were small in scope, but they allowed opportunities for the largely inexperienced men of the company to gain valuable training. First Platoon started the deployment by making some improvements to Camp Covington and the West-Pac compound in the forms of several sidewalks and tile jobs. From there they went to work on the Naval Magazine Handball Court, a concrete, CMU, and chain link fence structure which added significantly to the recreational facilities of that command. Second Platoon's first job was a headquarters for Coastal Squadron III, a patrol gunboat squadron based on Guam. The Com Cos Ron III building was the rehabilitation of an existing steel structure including sheetrock work, finish carpentry, painting, and tile laying. The project punch list was completed in November and the Commodore of the Squadron was very pleased with his new building. Third Platoon began the deployment by completing the steelwork at Com Cos Ron III which consisted mostly of sheet metal work, performing several camp maintenance and camp improvement jobs, and assisting Alfa Company in the upgrading of the Orote Point Mineral Products Facility. A few of the more memorable jobs which Charlie Company undertook later in the deployment were the Marine Barracks Reviewing Stand, the Chapel Bridge, the Recreation Building, the Settling Ponds at Orote Point, the 20'x48' buildings at Polaris Point, and the Swimming Pool for the Naval Hospital. The Swimming Pool was the largest job undertaken by Charlie Company having a materials value of approximately \$200,000. Most of the work done on the pool by the Battalion was earthwork, but the last month of the deployment saw Charlie Company placing steel for the pool and guniting the walls in place.

The deployment was definitely not all work for Charlie Company, however. The Company's softball team gave a boost to company spirit by winning a hard fought second place in the Battalion's softball league. The Proteus, a submarine tender, and other commands also enjoyed some informal competitions with the company's team. Other contenders for the company's liberty time were scuba diving and snorkelling off Guam's beautiful beaches, playing volleyball games, bowling at the Naval Station, taking karate lessons and attending karate tournaments, going on Boonie Stomps, beer drinking at the Club Mocambo and Camp Covington EM Club, an occasional USO show, a Seabee Ball, and the inevitable barracks bull sessions.



DETAIL ADAK



Detail Adak deployed from Gulfport to Adak in September 1973. The detail remained on Adak throughout the deployment, starting with thirty-six men but growing to fifty men before the end of the deployment. The men of detail Adak were tasked with the conversion of a 160 x 200 foot hanger into a modern hobby shop complex for the Naval Station Adak. The total material cost of the project was in excess of \$420,000 and involved over 6500 estimated mandays of labor. The project was turned over from NMCB-1 at 33 percent complete and by the end of the deployment it had progressed to 88 percent. The magnitude and nature of the hobby shop work made it a challenge. The harsh Aleutian weather and herculean supply problems added to the difficulties. Life on Adak was sometimes interesting with the eruption of the volcano, Great Sitkan and daily earth tremors. A meningitis scare and the Middle East alert also aroused curiosites. Some found many ways to spend off duty hours; hunting, fishing, square dancing and bowling were a few. Sometimes life was boring and days seemed to drag. Often there was day after day of snow, wind and rain and seldom if ever, did the sun come out. Everyone who went to Adak returned a little the better; not just in what he learned or what he did but in what he endured while he was there and knowing that he stayed until the end.







DETAIL MIDWAY




The first three months saw Detail Midway turn out a prodigious amount of work. They slurried the roads and taxiways, repaired the badly deteriorated downtown streets, and placed four brackish water wells. Completed in one third the originally estimated number of mandays, the water well project was the last started and the first finished by the detail.

But in December they ran out of materials for a large amount of their remaining jobs, so they asked the Public Works Department for some more work. The overworked PWD was happy to oblige and Detail Midway found themselves constructing parking lots and access roads, slurrying basketball courts and parking lots, and installing playground equipment. With each new fill-in project (particularly the playground equipment) the detail's stock rose higher amoung the 1800 Navy men and their dependents of Midway Island. Still they didn't have enough work to keep them busy so eleven men returned to the main body in Guam leaving nineteen men to finish up.

In January the work problems were compounded by daily rains and the wettest January in history. Already the aggregate for the remaining road repairs was forty-five days late and it looked like the detail would stay on Midway for the entire deployment. Early in February, though, the aggregate arrived and the detail was off and running again. They completed "I-62" and the rest of their road work, packed up their equipment and tools, and were back on Guam by the end of March.



















from behind the clouds!



No doubt, this unique, productive, exciting, frustrating, and delightful deployment is one which these lucky 27 will never forget.








