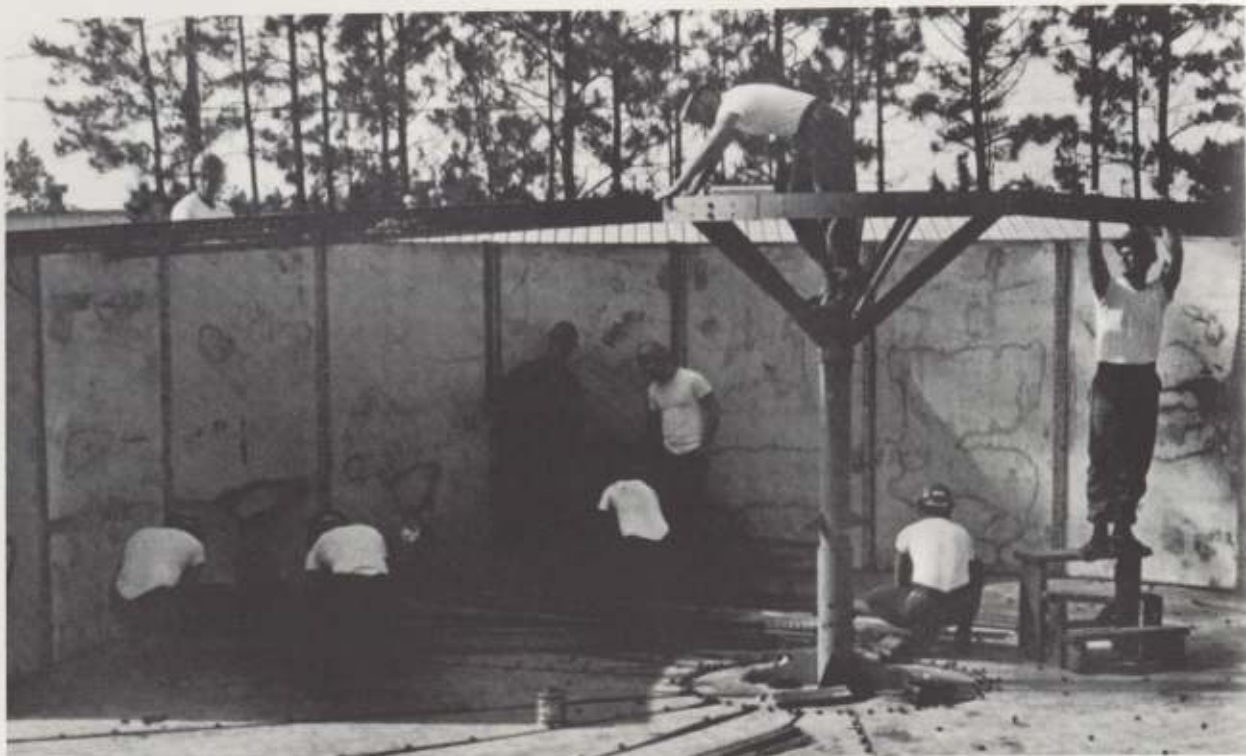

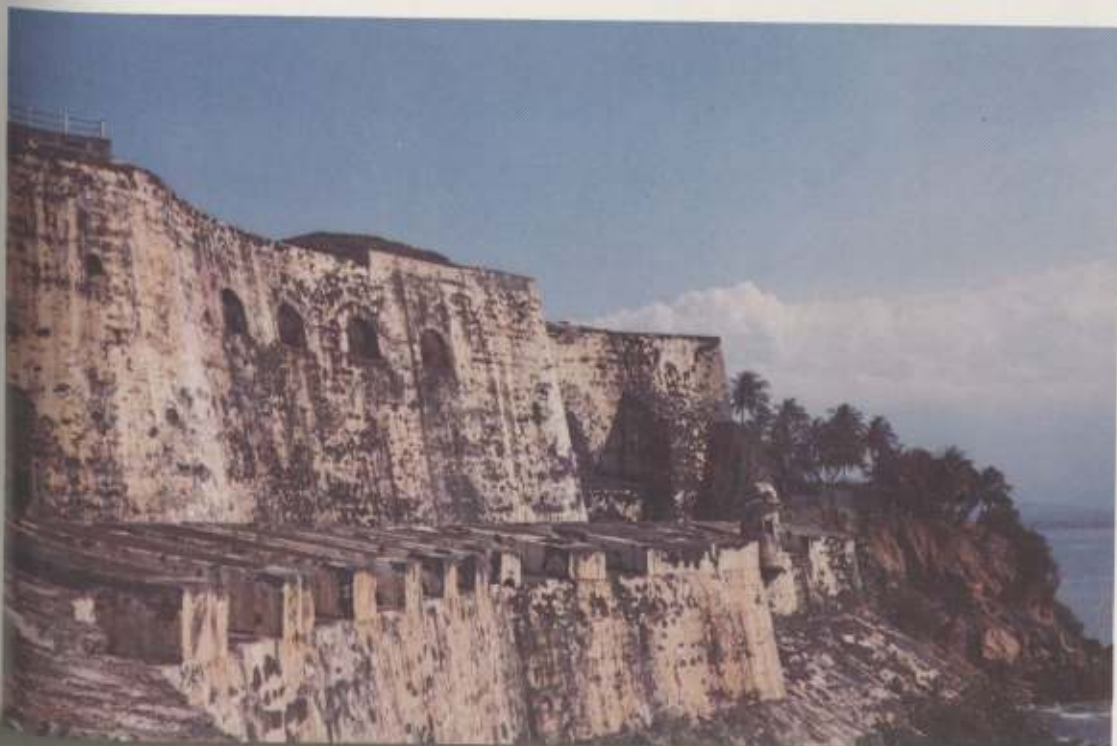

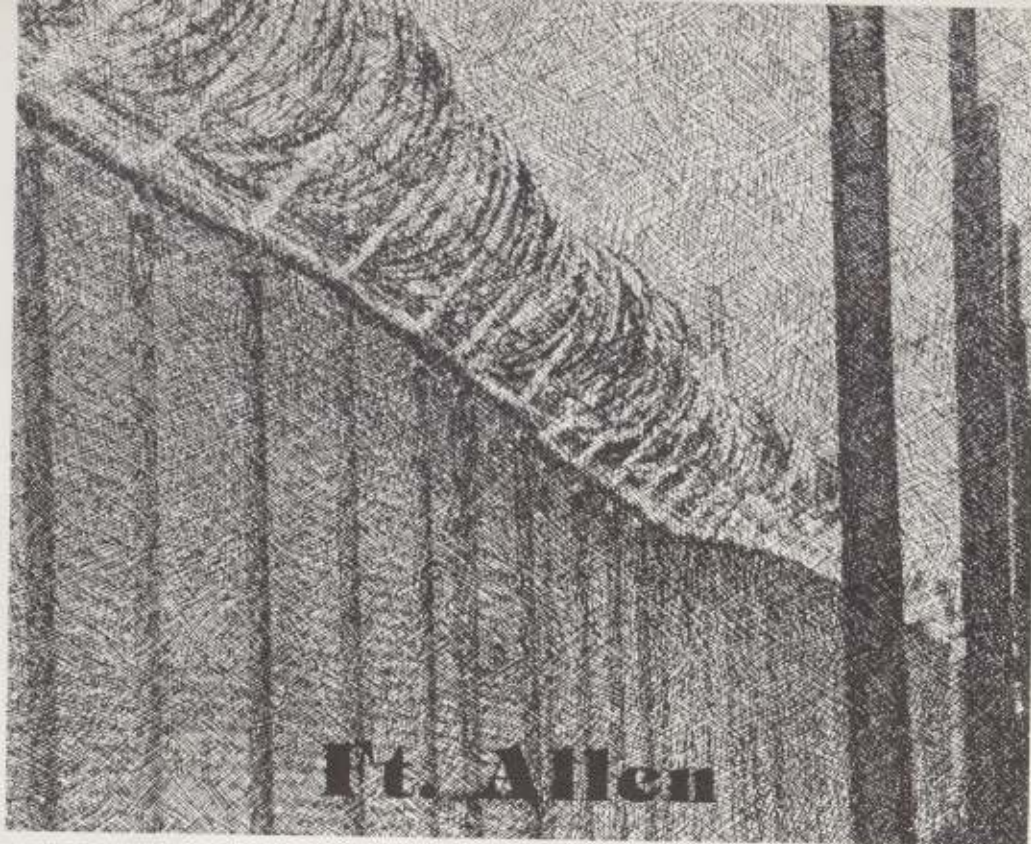

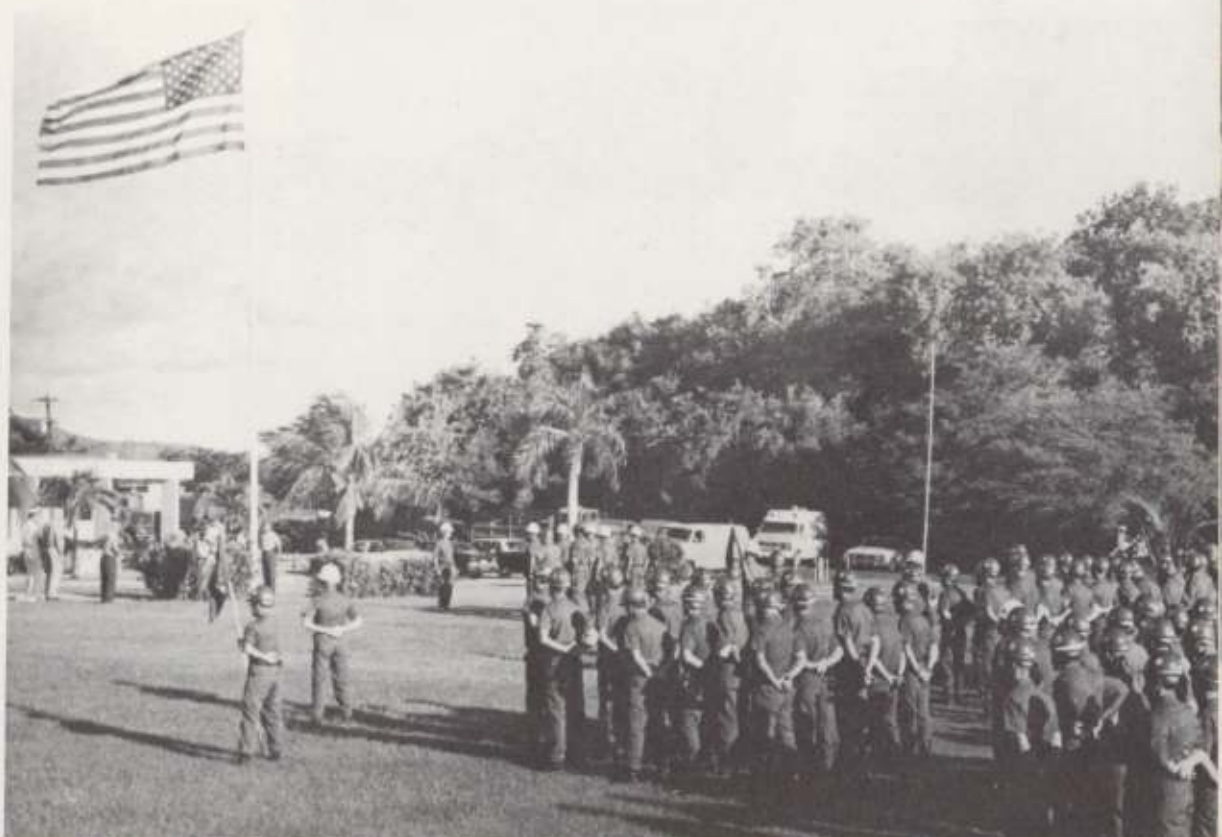

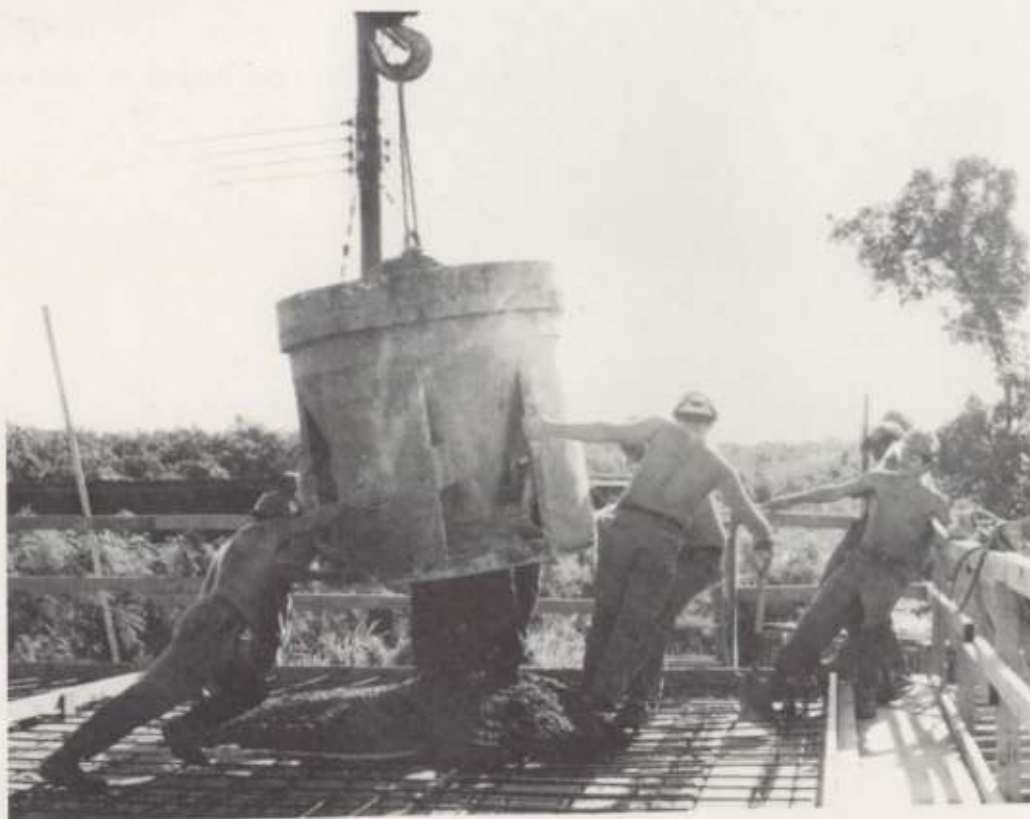

I took command of Sixty-Two on July 24, 1980. For a career naval officer, Command is his aspiration. I was extremely honored and pleased to have been given the opportunity of Command. My experiences to date with the Mighty Minutemen have exceeded all my expectations.

The completion of Superlative Sixty-Two's 1980/81 Caribbean deployment marks the close of another chapter in its proud history. It was our thirteenth deployment. After reviewing the results of previous deployments, our 1980/81 Caribbean has to rank among the most successful deployments in our history. Immediately upon deploying to Roosevelt Roads, Puerto Rico, we were tasked with the construction of a 2,000 person camp within 15 days, expanding it to 5,000 person capacity within 30 days at Fort Allen. Never before had a camp of this size been constructed in this period of time. Notwithstanding stops, starts, changes and other irritants that impede progress, the Mighty Minutemen rose to the occasion and completed the task. We subsequently completed all the work at Roosy that we were originally tasked with. The work performed by our various details on Diego Garcia, in Bridgeport, California, at Argentia, Newfoundland, on Andros Island, at Vieques Island, at Guantanamo Bay, Cuba and our Civic Action Team on YAP exceeded the most optimistic projections. The Command's performance in total can be termed nothing short of superlative. The Minutemen made it happen—You can be justifiably proud. Our strength and our future lies with our people.

Now that our Caribbean deployment is over, we must look forward to what is considered the most challenging deployment a Seabee battalion has ever faced: that of completing the Seabee construction on Diego Garcia. The Mighty Minutemen have a proud heritage of rising to the occasion. There is no doubt in my mind that we will rise to this one also. We are the best and are getting better. It has been my pleasure to serve with each and every one of you as your Commanding Officer. I look forward with unbounded enthusiasm to our 1981/82 Diego Garcia challenge.

When I took the helm of NMCB 62 for two short months in the end of May 1980, I said that making a change in commanding officers at this critical time was based on the faith that COMCBLANT and CINCLANTFLT had in the men of NMCB 62 to adapt and still be able to accomplish their mission without a break in stride.

As I reflect back on our 1980 homeport and our 1981 deployment to Puerto Rico and the Dets at Gitmo, Argentia, Bridgeport, Diego Garcia, Andros, Vieques and CAT Team 6211, I'm filled with pride in the fact that the officers and men of NMCB 62 fulfilled that faith and trust our superiors had in us. Our accomplishments in homeport and more importantly, the accomplishments of the deployment, have been phenomenal. We completed many homeport projects that helped the Navy and the community of Gulfport get together.

On deployment, we constructed a 5,000-man refugee camp in 30 days, completed all of our tasking and accepted new work to show how good we were. The people who supported the construction effort, the Supply, Admin/Personnel Department and the Training Department, performed with us like a well-oiled machine. We played a lot and had a lot of fun.

The comments of an unknown author seem appropriate: "The struggle has been long. Unending it seemed. The burden was heavy. But we reached out together with strong arms. Desire fueled by pride lifted us above first one test, then another and another. We met the test. Conquered it with new achievement. We're still the best. That's established. There's no question now. Confidence is ours. We will continue."
