




MINUTEMEN SERVE WITH PRIDE

Naval Mobile Construction Battalion SIXTY-TWO is a proud unit with a noble heritage, Originally organized with construction workers from the Midwest on Dec. 7, 1942, and commissioned at Davisville, R.L., on Dec. 30, 1942, the "Mighty Minutemen" first won fame at Pearl Harbor where they built many of the facilities at the submarine base. Some of them remain today. Later, after landing at Iwo Jima, they repaired and maintained captured enemy airstrips. The battalion eventually moved to Japan where it was decommissioned on Sept. 15, 1945.



Since recommissioning at Gulfport, Miss., on July 2, 1966, the battalion had deployed to Vietnam four times to provide construction support for American forces in combat areas and to stand by to fight if necessary. They had also deployed to Puerto Rico, the British Indian Ocean Territory island of Diego Garcia; the island of Guam; Rota, Spain; and Camp Shields, Okinawa.





"The Minutemen Battalion" has earned three Meritorious Unit Commendations and two Navy Unit Commendations in its 22 years of active service.

This command is also a four-time recipient of the Peltier Award, given annually by the Society of American Military Engineers to the construction battalion it feels is the best example of excellent construction and military preparedness.




NMCB-62 is the only battalion to receive the award four times.

During the Vietnam War, NMCB-62 won the Peltier Award twice in 1969 and 1970. The third one was received in April 1978, recognizing the battalion's outstanding construction achievements on the island base of Diego Garcia, located in the British Indian Ocean Territory (Chagos Archipelagos group). The fourth award was presented to the battalion for its outstanding work in Rota, Spain.




NMCB-62 was the last full battalion to serve in the construction effort on Diego Garcia, ending an 11-year history of Seabees on the island in July 1982. The battalion also had the last detachment of Seabees on site at Diego Garcia, ending with the battalion's deployment to Guam in September 1983.





During the "85"-"86" deployment to the Pacific, the Minutemen worked from the mainbody site in Okinawa, Japan and four Detachment sites: Adak, Alaska; Iwakuni, Japan; Sasebo, Japan; and CAT 6213 deployed to the island of Yap. The dedicated work by Sixty-Two resulted in some 33,942 mandays of quality construction and sharpening the men's military readiness through one of the best "Air Detachment" exercises.



Commanding Officer

Commander E. W. Hamm, CEC, USN, has led NMCB-62 to the completion of the Puerto Rico Deployment, a Homeport training evolution and this deployment to the Pacific, since assuming command of the battalion in July 1984.

Setting new goals for the battalion, CDR Hamm has ensured the highest quality of construction, the utmost in Military Readiness and personnel performance for each Minuteman.

Prior to assuming command of Sixty-Two, CDR Hamm served as a Line Officer on board the USS Witek and USS Glennon. After convertion to a CEC Officer he has served with PWC, Pensacola, APWO, NAVSUPPACT, Naples, Operations Officer for NMCB-133, Director Military Readiness Division, CECOS, Port Hueneme, CEC Detailer and OICC/ROICC, Sewells Point area, Norfolk, Va.







Executive Officer

LCDR Edward L. Kornegay, CEC, USN, NMCB-62 Executive Officer, serves as the right hand man to the Commanding Officer. Whether at battalion quarters or a staff meeting, the Executive Officer acts as an administrative assistant to handle details, both large and small, concerning the ongoing business of the battalion.

From approving enlisted evaluations to presiding at XO's Screening, the Executive Officer maintains constant contact with Company Commanders, Department Heads and Special Assistants to coordinate the work of the command on a daily basis to ensure a smooth running operation.

During the Holiday season the chaplain made sure the meaning of the holidays weren't forgotten in the daily routine.






Command Career Counselor





ALFA COMPANY



The title of Alfa Company Commander was held by two Officers during the deployment: Lt. Eugene Desaulniers and CWO4 Lloyd Dyer. Lt. Desaulniers was the "A-6" through the homeport and majority of the deployment. In November CWO4 Dyer took the helm, after moving over from the "S-2" position.

The Company Chief, EQCM L. J. Cole, handled the major part of the company's administrative workload and over saw the company chiefs.

Coordination of the Battalion's transportation needs was handled by EOC William Hickman, the ALFA Company Transportation Supervisor. The yard crew led by EO1 John Farrell, the Assistant Transportation Supervisor and Yard Boss, kept the motto "You call - we haul" alive with the help EO2 Edward Doyle, the Alfa Company Dispatcher and EO2 Michael Nelson, Yard crewleader. Forty-Eight Alpha will live on with the Bravo crew that worked on the electrical distribution project at Futenma Marine Corps Air Station.

Not a person but an old wooden power pole that served its purpose well.

Project Supervisor, CE1 Robert Patnaude, had his crew on the job site before 0600 and worked through the day and long into the night. That seemed to be the pace of Bravo Company, long hours and dedication.

The Futenma project was one of the two major projects for Bravo Company. The other was the renovation of the electrical distribution system at White Beach.

The White Beach Project consisted of replacing a wooden pole, overhead primary electrical distribution system with a new concrete pole system. The new system was installed parallel to the existing system and energized by section to minimize interruptions. The project included the running of 5175 feet of primary overhead and 2280 feet of primary underground conductors and 14,800 feet of secondary overhead and 16,800 feet of secondary underground conductors.





S-2 TRAINING



BU2 Calvin Bonner directed the crew at the 60 year old gym, in the replacement of damaged wooden structural members, wooden siding with metal siding and the existing men's and women's locker rooms with larger ones. When the project is completed tentative plans are to use the building as a Base Fitness Center.

At Hario-Shima, Ordnance Storage Magazines, BU2 Stephen Lemming directed the crew in constructing the fourth 4,000 square foot Pre-Engineered Building (PEB) that will be used to store ordnance. Each PEB constructed has required placing a 130 cubic yard concrete pad and installing a secondary electrical grounding system. In addition, the steel buildings are modified for skylights, louvers and steel doors.

The Camel Construction crew under the leadership of SW2 John Attaway, turned over the 20 foot by 30 foot floating separator to Public Works. The separator was constructed of 2-1/2 foot diameter steel pipe, which required all welds to be pressure tested to ensure water tightness. T-type moorings were fabricated and welded on the separator corners. After the pipe was assembled, wooden fenders, a zinc anode protection system and wooden deck boards were installed. The floating separator will be used to separate two ships that are berthed side by side.










Civic Action Team Yap 6213



After arriving and taking over Camp Garfield in June, the detail got busy with their tasking. During this unique deployment to Yap, CAT 6213 fulfilled its mission of providing social-economic development and projecting a favorable military image by the undertaking of small scale construction projects and conducting a formal training program for the local workers and providing medical assistance to the local population.

Having adapted extremely well to their new environment, CAT 6213 is working their way towards the completion of a very successful deployment. Completed projects include a basketball court extension in the village of Rumuuq, a 12 foot by 12 foot by 8 foot reinforced concrete water catchment tank and complete electrical renovation of the village of Maedriich, the partitioning and electrical wiring of a community center in the village of Faraq, construction of an access road, a two inch concrete cap on the floor and wall plastering of a men's house in the village of Taeb.

In the area of training, CAT 6213 has graduated six trainees from an intensive nine month program concentrating on construction safety, construction techniques and the maintenance of construction equipment. Currently ten trainees are enrolled in the program and are scheduled to graduate after CAT 6213 returns to homeport.

The Team's Hospital Corpsman has had his hands busy since arriving. He has seen over 3,100 patients to date. Additionally, he has participated in one MEDEVAC from the outer island of Ulithi and has certified 26 members of the hospital staff in CPR.
